I am a specialist in teaching a variety of subjects that are based on my (socio-) pragmatic expertise (use of language in various contexts), genre theories, written/spoken discourse and academic writing, but also a spectrum ranging from semantics to pragmatics, inter/intra-pragmatic, inter-ethnic communication, discourse (can tailored interests students. analysis be to special of e.q. stylistics/pragmastylistics) with publications reflecting the range; I can operationalise theories and put them into practice, in a hands-on method. My teaching (both UG/PG) has always been in the English Language (medium and subject).

- University of Birmingham: From 5th August to 18th September 2015, I worked as a pre-sessional EAP teacher for the University of Birmingham (Birmingham International Academy; line manager: Cathryn Overall). My students were mainly Chinese with (un)conditional offers in Business, Accountancy, Economics and Engineering. They had to progress from IELTS 5.0/5.5 to 6.0/6.5 and onwards. - Aristotle University, Thessaloniki: I have worked for the Dept of English Language and Literature for 30 years. The Dept (all teaching in English) has a versatile profile, preparing students for a variety of further studies and/or careers ranging from ELT teaching (the majority) to communications sectors, interpretation and translation, and the literary and performance domains, amongst others. I have a long record of very positive student-evaluation and successful Ph.D supervision reflecting the range of my interests, and quite a few of my former students are now colleagues teaching EAP in HE.

I'm a member of BALEAP (BALEAPINDIV263), amongst other academic societies, too. I was country research team leader of COST Action (European COST IS0703 "Learning to Write Effectively") a joint European enterprise for the duration of the programme (2009-12) (on-line volume on academic writing in Europe's HE: https://digitalcollection.zhaw.ch/handle/11475/1056). My international reviewing also includes reviewing for AILA [International Applied Linguistics Association] World Congresses, (as for 2014's 14th World Congress, Brisbane, emailed proof available), as well as for the international journals *Pragmatics and Society, Journal of Pragmatics , Erkentniss, Text&Talk* (and not only), (email-proof), while I sit on the editorial board of the *International Review of Pragmatics, Applied Linguistics* and *International Journal for Language Studies*. Related to the field of written discourse (in L1, L2 or SL) is also my Erasmus-training in the IoE (Institute of Education, Univ

of London), where I audited classes and acquainted myself with their practices for 10 days at CAPLITS in February 2010, (Lesley Coles, at the time: Head of Academic Writing Centre (CAPLIts), http://www.ioe.ac.uk/staff/lccn_19.html, I.coles@ioe.ac.uk). The former Head of CAPLits of the IoE, Prof. Ken Hyland, was invited twice by me to give talks and seminars to professional language teachers of LANCE (Language Centre for Foreign Language Teaching, <u>http://www.lance.auth.gr/en</u>), the equivalent Centre at Aristotle University where I served as vice-Head for most of the noughties (certifying letter available); I also invited Prof. Brian Street of King's College, to mention just two eminent scholars in the field invited to the centre for seminars/further training of our in-service tutors. The main mission of LANCE tutors in English is to teach various genres, but mostly written discourse and specifically EAP, to Aristotle University students who have good English.

Additionally, as I am an expert in pragmatics and discourse analysis, both being the backbone of EAP, language teaching methodologies and many social/applied fields, I have a related interdisciplinary command and versatility to tailor my material to specific teaching needs. Pragmatics is also the language component that ASD or ASC (autistic) individuals lack or are impaired in. (I'm an expert in this). I am also competent in corpus linguistics with publications in the field.

IT: I have used e-learning platforms interactively for all my courses since when available at my work (2002, blackboard), recently transferred to moodle (I can use it expertly and have upgraded all courses appropriately for this platform, visuals even in the courses-list), have been teaching with power point presentations and used ppt for all my conference presentations ever since 2000 (which was much too early internationally) sparing no effort/time to make courses appealing. I use technology both inside and outside the classroom. Over a hundred presentations with tech support made me an expert in presentation skills (on top of the relevant theory) and as a teacher in teaching them.

I am a mature, and very energetic and experienced lecturer/tutor, with a versatile teaching capability and experience, reflected in my research and courses taught (see homepage for descriptions). My main strengths are my experience and my profound expertise as a linguist and discourse analyst. I have theories of language use and functionality ([socio-]pragmatics, etc.) literally at my fingertips; I know how language works (not just its structure, etc.), and this knowledge informs intelligently my teaching methodology and materials design. I am also committed to professional self-development. I am dedicated to teaching and my students, and spare no effort to make my teaching sessions appealing (always preparing slides and learning materials resourcefully trying to relate them to students' interests/background/field of study, drawing on current affairs, or material from specific disciplines, as required, etc.).
